

## BROADBAND EXPANSION IN PERSON & GRANVILLE COUNTIES

NORTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

**Broadband & Digital Opportunity** 

On June 11th, Governor Josh Stein announced over \$58 million in funding through the Completing Access to Broadband (CAB) program to expand high-speed internet access across North Carolina. This investment will connect over 10,000 homes and businesses in 26 counties. Locally:

- Person County will see 1,014 homes and businesses connected, covering 52% of the remaining unserved areas.
- Granville County will see 26 locations connected about 12% of the county's remaining need.

Stein said, "I look forward to continuing to bring highspeed internet to every corner of the state so that people can communicate with family and friends, grow their business, or access telehealth services or educational opportunities."

### GOLDEN LEAF LAUNCHES \$25 MILLION INITIATIVE TO SUPPORT NC MIDDLE SCHOOLS

Fifteen middle schools across North Carolina have been chosen to join the Golden LEAF Schools Initiative, a five-year, \$25 million effort funded by the Golden LEAF Foundation.

## 2025 CDBG NEIGHBORHOOD REVITALIZATION: NOTICE OF FUNDING AVAILABILITY

2025 CDBG Neighborhood Revitalization: Notice of Funding Availability The Rural Economic Development Division (REDD), North Carolina Department of Commerce has opened the 2025 CDBG Neighborhood Revitalization (CDBG-NR) program. The CDBG-NR program is designed to provide grants to non-entitlement local governments for housing, housing-related activities, and public facilities. Approximately \$4.75 million of the \$12,280,856 available is set aside for the Rural Community Development Fund. This fund allows Tier 1 communities to submit non-housing projects as a sole activity. FEMA declared disaster areas due to Hurricane Helene have also been given specific wavers for this funding cycle.


## DON DAVIS VISITS LOCAL FARMERS ACROSS THE REGION

## **RPO UPDATE**

The Kerr-Tar Rural Planning Organization (RPO) has officially opened the project solicitation period for the Prioritization 8.0 (P8) cycle. This is a critical opportunity for member governments to submit transportation projects for consideration in the next round of Strategic Transportation Investments (STI) funding. The RPO, has been allocated 13 project submission slots per mode—including highway, bicycle/pedestrian, aviation, rail, and transit. These slots will cover both new project proposals and any projects removed from the database at the end of the P7 cycle for resubmittal.



SPOT Online is expected to open on July 28<sup>th</sup> with the submittal deadline of September 30<sup>th</sup> for all projects. The Carryover Modifications and Deletions deadline remains on July 18th.

Over 170 kids showed up, including several summer programs full of kids. It was a wonderful opportunity for kids to set down their phones, pick up a book, and dive into reading. Several participants have already turned in their weekly reading logs and earned prizes, proof that summer reading is off to a strong start!

KITTRELL JOB CORPS RAPID RESPONSE

On June 4th, Kerr-Tar/NCWorks, Capital Area WDB, Durham WDB, Vance-Granville CC, Wake Tech, Durham Tech, and NC Commerce hosted a Rapid Response event at the Kittrell Job Corps

Center to support students and staff during a time of transition.

The event served 234 students, many of whom are also enrolled at Vance-Granville CC, helping connect them with workforce services and answer questions about off-campus support. NCWorks staff assisted with enrollment, now required by the U.S. Department of Labor. Support was also provided to 129 staff members preparing to exit the facility. The NCWorks Mobile Unit was on-site from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., offering access to technology and assistance.

#### Two sessions were held:

- 9 a.m. 12 p.m.: 108 students
- 1 p.m. 4 p.m.: 87 students

This event highlighted strong collaboration among regional partners to ensure continuity of support and services.

## HEALTH INDUSTRY ROUNTABLE

Kerr Tar/NCWorks hosted a Health Industry Roundtable
June 17th at the NCWorks Career Center in Henderson.
Health Leaders Convened to Address Critical Challenges
in the Industry. More than 25 leaders from across 5
counties the health industry gathered for a powerful and
solutions–focused Health Industry Workforce Roundtable,
aimed at tackling some of the most pressing issues facing



the sector today, from workforce shortages and burnout to recruitment, retention, and equity in healthcare. The roundtable brought together stakeholders from hospitals, public health agencies, community health centers, workforce development organizations, and education institutions. The goal was to share insights, identify barriers, and forge new strategies to strengthen and sustain the healthcare workforce. "Healthcare is at a crossroads," We're seeing increased demand for services at a time when our workforce is stretched thin. This roundtable gives us the chance to listen, collaborate, and take real action together.

The roundtable featured panel discussions, breakout sessions, and interactive workshops focused on five key themes:

- 1. Recruitment and Pipeline Development
- 2. Retention and Professional Growth
- 3. Burnout and Wellbeing
- 4. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion
- 5. Public-Private Partnerships for Workforce Support



Participants shared both data and lived experiences, pointing to innovative programs, successful models, and persistent gaps. One popular session spotlighted how local partnerships with community colleges are creating new career pathways for underrepresented populations.

**Our workforce is the heartbeat of healthcare, "It we don't care for them, we can't care for our communities."** The event closed with a commitment to produce a summary report, capturing key takeaways and proposed action items.
