## \$1 Billion in EPA loans now available through the Water and Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) Program

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency EPA announced the availability of approximately \$1 billion in credit assistance for water infrastructure projects under the new Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) program. This financing will help support approximately \$2 billion in total infrastructure investment. EPA's WIFIA program will provide long-term, low-cost credit assistance in the form of direct loans and loan guarantees to creditworthy water projects. WIFIA provides another option for financing large infrastructure projects – generally at least \$20 million – in addition to the State Revolving Funds and bond market. WIFIA is available to state, local, and tribal governments; private entities; partnerships; and State Revolving Fund programs. Prospective borrowers may submit letters of interest from January 10, 2017 until midnight on April 10, 2017. For more information, click here.

### Kerr-Tar Council of Governments Revolving Loan Fund

The Kerr-Tar Regional Council of Governments administers a Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) to assist existing businesses as well as new entrepreneurs in securing financing they are otherwise unable to secure through traditional channels. The primary goal of the RLF program is to create new jobs in the region. Preference is given to businesses that will add full-time skilled or semi-skilled positions. The source of funding is the Federal Economic Development Administration (EDA). Some specific guidelines may apply. # Department of Agriculture Invites Applications for the Rural Broadband Access Loans and Loan Guarantees Program

The Rural Utilities Service (RUS), an agency of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), <u>announces</u> that it is accepting applications for fiscal year (FY) 2017 for the <u>Rural Broadband Access Loan and Loan Guarantee program</u> (the Broadband Program). The Rural Broadband Access Loan and Loan Guarantee Program (Broadband Program) furnishes loans and loan guarantees to provide funds for the costs of construction, improvement, or acquisition of facilities and equipment needed to provide service at the broadband lending speed in eligible rural areas. There will be two application windows for FY 2017. The first application submission will be from **March 1, 2017 through March 31, 2017** and the second application window will be from **September 1, 2017 through September 30, 2017**. All applications can only be submitted through <u>RD Apply</u> online application system.

### Department of Agriculture Invites Applications for Technical Assistance Grants for Rural Transportation Systems

The Department of Agriculture invites applications for grants to provide technical assistance for Rural Transportation (RT) systems under the Rural Business Development Grant (RBDG) program for fiscal year 2017. Completed applications must be received in the USDA Rural Development State Office no later than 4:30 p.m. (local time) on March 31, 2017. For more information, click here.

### Department of Agriculture invites applications for REDLG Grants and Loans

The Department of Agriculture invites applications for grants under the Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant (REDLG) Programs for fiscal year 2017. The REDLG programs may include business startup costs, business expansion, business incubators, technical assistance feasibility studies, advanced telecommunications services and computer networks for medical, educational, and job training services, and community facilities projects. The deadlines for completed applications to be received in the USDA Rural Development State Offices no later than 4:30 p.m. (local time) are: Third Quarter, March 31, 2017; and Fourth Quarter, June 30, 2017. ### U.S. Conference of Mayors, Wells Fargo Announces 2017 CommunityWINS Grant Program

The U.S. Conference of Mayors (USCM) and Wells Fargo today (January 17) announced a call for nominations for the 2017 CommunityWINS grant program, aimed at accelerating neighborhood revitalization, economic development, and job creation in municipalities across the country. Launched in 2015, the CommunityWINS grant program includes a \$3 million investment by the Wells Fargo Foundation over three years. CommunityWINS grant program is administered by The U.S. Conference of Mayors and funded by the Wells Fargo Foundation. Through a competitive application process, the USCM will determine eligibility and administer grant funds to eligible nonprofits in six cities to support neighborhood revitalization, economic development and job creation initiatives. USCM member cities can nominate up to three eligible nonprofit initiatives or programs that address one of the following categories:

- Neighborhood stabilization projects designed to stimulate growth and stability while assisting in the removal of blight and the rebuilding of neighborhoods.
- Economic development projects designed to promote business development.
- Job creation projects designed to aid in local job creation or assist in job training.

#### **CEDS Committee**

The COG hosted its second Comprehensive Economic Development Strategies (CEDS) Committee meeting in late February. The event was at the House of Ribeyes in Oxford. During this session, Committee members further expanded on Region K's *Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities & Threats*. The CEDS process, a requirement of the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration, is designed to serve as a regional multi-county area economic development strategy plan. Input is received from a diverse array of stakeholders, all working collaboratively to achieve this goal.

# Census 2020

The United States Census Bureau has begun the ramp up to the 2020 Census, and in January the Local Update of Census Addresses (LUCA) program launched with advanced letters being mailed to the highest elected officials. The Census Bureau will hold informational workshops this Spring before inviting local governments to designate LUCA coordinators for their participation in July. LUCA is the only opportunity offered to tribal, state, and local governments to review and comment on the U.S. Census Bureau's residential address list for their jurisdiction prior to the 2020 Census. Finding decent, secure and affordable rental housing is increasingly difficult for many North Carolinians A recent Center for Urban and Regional Studies (CURS) study found that more than 377,000 rental households in the state are held back from leading fulfilling and productive lives by living in housing that imposes a severe cost burden on residents, is overcrowded or lacks critical facilities. This report identifies locations in North Carolina with high levels of multiple housing deficits and includes an analysis of the findings and a discussion of policies and programs for addressing the housing needs of the state.
