part of a grant program that helps to improve the lives of individuals, employers, and overall community. One of Deborah's proudest achievements has been implementing Kerr-Tar's Workforce Development Board's Performance Matters Focus Group, which meets quarterly to discuss WIOA Grants' performance outcomes. The goal is to ensure data integrity and compliance fulfillments, discuss ideas, and implement plans to improve overall program performance and ultimately maintain successful outcomes for our Local Area WDB, our customers and job seekers, and our local businesses/employers. Fun fact about Deborah: she began taking violin lessons three years ago and finds so much joy in playing the violin along with the keyboard, and singing praise music.



Major announcements were made last week regarding the US Economic Development Administration's (EDA) American Rescue Plan Funding. Six unique programs were announced, collectively called **Investing in America's Communities**, and applications were opened immediately. What does this mean for you? This EDA investment is the largest economic development initiative from the Department of Commerce in decades (\$3 billion) and if utilized, can help your community build back better than ever.

Programs include:

- Build Back Better Regional Challenge (\$1 billion):
   Designed to revitalize regional economies.
- 2. <u>Good Jobs Challenge</u> (\$500 million): This program will develop and strengthen regional workforce training systems and sector-based partnerships with a focus on programs targeted to women, people of color, and historically underserved communities.
- Economic Adjustment Assistance (\$500 million):
   Grants will help hundreds of communities put people back to work through projects tailored to meet local needs.
- 4. <u>Indigenous Communities</u> (\$100 million): Program will work hand in hand with Tribal Governments and Indigenous communities to develop economic development projects.
- Travel, Tourism, & Outdoor Recreation (\$750 million): Program will focus on accelerating recovery of communities that rely on these sectors.
- 6. <u>Statewide Planning, Research, and Networks</u>
  (\$90 million): Grants include funding for state planning efforts as well as grants to build Communities of Practice to extend technical assistance to support EDA's work with grantees.

# Granville County Receives SPR Funding

Granville County has been awarded State Planning and Research funds from the North Carolina Department of Transportation's Transportation Planning Division to begin a Feasibility Study along the Butner and Oxford portion of the East Coast Greenway, either primarily along SR 1004 (Old 75) or a rail-with-trail option along the Norfolk Southers (NS) line. Work on the feasibility study is expected to begin in the fall of 2021. At the July 22 KTRPO meeting, the additional funding received by the TPD was approved. Funds will be used to solicit consultants through the RFLOI and follow the state's procurement process. The KTRPO will provide the Towns of Butner and Oxford with periodic updates.



# **Exciting Economic Development Announcements**

Glen Raven, Inc., a leading provider of innovative performance textiles, will create 205 new jobs as it expands its Custom Fabrics operations in Warren County according to the Governor's Office. The company will invest up to \$82 million in Norlina. Read more in the press release found HERE.

Polywood, a manufacturer of outdoor furniture made from recycled plastics, will expand its operations in Person County to create 300 jobs over 5 years. #### RAISE GRANTS

Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity

The Kerr-Tar Rural Planning Organization (KTRPO) submitted its Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) Grant to the United States Department of Transportation last month. The RPO, working with the East Coast Greeway, submitted a Rural S-Line Corridor Feasibility Study identifying segments through

rural communities within Granville, Vance, and Warren Counties. The RPO thanks our members of Congress, the North Carolina General Assembly, and the mayors for their letters of support.

# 2021 CDBG Neighborhood Revitalization Program

The Rural Economic Development Division (REDD) is pleased to announce the opening of the 2021 Community Development Block Grant Neighborhood Revitalization Program (CDBG-NR). The NC Department of Commerce will administer approximately \$10 million in CDBG-NR funds awarded to the State by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. Eligible activities include housing rehabilitation, infrastructure support for housing development, and public facilities. Special consideration will be given to projects impacted by the Pre-2015 US Treasury recapture. As required, North Carolina State CDBG allocations will be allocated to non-entitlement areas across the state, which include incorporated municipalities under 50,000 people and counties under 200,000 in population.

Commerce now requires that all visitors to the building have a scheduled appointment. For this reason, applications and other program documents must be sent by US Postal Service or an overnight service. All applications are due to REDD by Thursday, October 14, 2021 at 4:00 pm. 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


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
