

American Rescue Plan: What We Know

American Rescue Plan Local Fiscal Recovery Funds are being distributed, but several questions remain about how these funds can be spent. Local government units have many resources available to them as they make decisions about how to use this funding. For example, UNC School of Government (SOG) recently held a <u>Basics of the American Rescue Plan Course</u>, which was a detailed look at all aspects of the Local Fiscal Recovery Funds legislation. SOG is also continuing to host weekly <u>Office Hours</u>, where local government units have the opportunity to hear the most recent ARPA updates and ask any questions they might have.

In addition to Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, we also know that the state received Fiscal Recovery Funds. The NC House, Senate, and Governor are currently negotiating the details of the budget, but stay tuned for more information!

One piece of additional Federal legislation to keep an eye out for is the State, Local, Tribal, and Territorial Fiscal Recovery, Infrastructure, and Disaster Relief Flexibility Act, which was passed by the Senate and has been introduced by the US House of Representatives for a vote. This legislation would strengthen the Fiscal Recovery Funds by providing state and local officials with the flexibility to invest funds in transportation, infrastructure, and government services. The National Association of Counties website hosts a table that contains official values from the US Senate of how much counties will be able to use towards transportation and infrastructure projects or government services under this bill.

Ombudsman Update

Kim Hawkins, Kerr-Tar AAA Ombudsman, completed the Annual Ombudsman Report for FY 2021. Compared to 2020, complaints increased in 2021. Kim attributes this to the complexity of the complaints and restrictions on follow-up visits to facilities and residents during Covid. Kim is currently handling 11 open complaints.

Kim is also recruiting new Community Advisory Committee members in four of our five counties. The state has established new volunteer training requirements that greatly increase the number of hours of required orientation and ongoing training, which may affect recruitment. Volunteer meetings are currently being held virtually, and Kim is transitioning to face-to-face meetings as appropriate, one county at a time.



AAA Programs



As we enter into the beginning stages of our Comprehensive Development Plan update, it's a perfect time to think about how we want to use our land, how we want to grow, and what actions we need to take to get there. With the additions of Cynthia and Rachel to Warren County, we can responsibly and strategically progress Warren County forward," said Duncan.

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Warren County Tops State in Visitor Spending Growth in 2020



Domestic and international visitors to and within Warren County spent \$49.6 million in 2020, an increase of 32% from 2019, according to an annual study commissioned by Visit North Carolina, a unit of the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina (EDPNC). For a second year in a row, Warren County's growth rate was the highest in North Carolina compared to all other counties from the year 2019 to 2020.

Of the \$49.6 million related to visitor spending, \$12 million came from lodging, \$15.5 million from food and beverage, \$6.7 million from recreation, \$4.8 million from retail, and \$10.6 million from transportation. The study also reveals that Warren County was the only county in its region to see growth; all other counties in the North Central region saw a decrease in visitor spending, including Chatham, Durham, Franklin, Granville, Harnett, Johnston, Lee, Orange, Person, Vance, and Wake counties.

"We are fortunate that Warren County's travel and tourism industry has been able to demonstrate such resilience during a difficult year," stated Charla Duncan, Director of Warren County Community & Economic Development. "Individually, many of our businesses have certainly experience similar challenges as other small businesses across America during this pandemic. The strength in Warren County, particularly during 2020, is that our natural and cultural assets are a stable, safe, and desirable resource for visitors."

"Warren County has opportunities for day trippers, weekenders, and repeat visitors, and our local economy benefits from that," Duncan said. "It is great to see this positive news as we adjust to the long-term impact of the pandemic," said County Manager Vincent Jones. "We hope that this new energy we are seeing as people discover and rediscover the charm of Warren County is sustained going forward."

According to Visit NC data, the Warren County travel and tourism industry directly employs 231 people; this is an increase in employment related to visitor spending since 2019. The total payroll generated by the tourism industry in Warren County in 2020 was \$10.1 million. These statistics come from the Economic Impact of travel on North Carolina Counties 2020, which can be accessed HERE. The study was prepared for Visit NC by Tourism Economics in collaboration with the US Travel Association. Warren County has seen an increase in visitor spending every year since 2016.



Open for Business Loans Available

Many small and local businesses in the Kerr-Tar region have been negatively affected by COVID-19. Please be aware that our Open for Business Loans are available to businesses in our region through the Kerr-Tar COG. These loan opportunities are being offered in an effort to provide support and assistance to **small to medium size businesses** to get back up and running.

The Open for Business Loan is a non-forgivable interest-free loan, ranging from \$10,000-\$100,000. Eligible borrowers are small to medium size (1-99 employees) businesses who have been in business for at least 12 months and must be located in Franklin, Granville, Person, Vance, or Warren counties. All loans will require a personal guarantee and additional collateral. Funds can only be used for working capital, inventory, and/or equipment and require an application fee of \$200. Standard loan terms of 5-10 years. To apply, visit www.kerrtarcog.org and click on the "Open for Business Loan" tab.



One major change this year is that businesses are <u>no longer required to demonstrate a loss of revenue as a result of the pandemic</u>. Our goal is to help get local businesses back up and running. Please share this information with anyone you think would benefit from these loans.

The Open for Business Loan Program is locally administered, funded by the US Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration with funds from the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. Applications are available on the Kerr-Tar COG website or by calling Kerr-Tar COG at 252-436-2040. Applications should be completed as soon as possible as funding is limited.

Public Input Needed on NCDOT Serivces

The N.C. Department of Transportation is again <u>asking the public for feedback</u> on how the agency is performing and ways it can improve its customer service. Now in its sixth year, NCDOT's survey takes about 15 minutes to complete, and the link is mobile-friendly. Participation can help the department identify ways to make North Carolina transportation services safer, more efficient and customer focused. Administered by North Carolina State University's Institute for Transportation

Research and Education, the survey is grouped into eight core transportation services: motor vehicle transportation (highway), bicycle, pedestrian, transit (local bus), passenger rail, ferry, general aviation and the Division of Motor Vehicles. The N.C. General Assembly requires the survey and results be used to measure NCDOT's customer service performance across the department. Survey responses must be received by the end of November. The results will be available to the public on the agency's website, www.ncdot.gov, by March 2021.

Ms. Michele Zattoni was a Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) at Duke VA, where she entered the VR&E program pursuing a degree in Human Resources. Upon completing the program, Michele had difficulty achieving employment in her field of study, partially because of her extensive medical background. However, the Disabled Veteran Outreach Program Specialist and Staff provided multiple counseling sessions, functional resume building, and quality referrals to which she received interviews, but lacked job offers/responses. After applying for numerous positions, the NCWorks staff sourced out a job opportunity with the Social Security Administration, refined her resume, and discussed interview strategies. Shortly after applying for the position, Michele was hired almost immediately. The HR department describes Michele's background and interview skills as flawless. Michele began work in September with improved wages. Michele is just one example of how hard work, patience, and persistence pay off.

Accepting Applications for "Recreation Economy for Rural Communities"

The Recreation Economy for Rural Communities planning assistance program helps communities identify strategies to grow their outdoor recreation economy and revitalize their Main Streets. A planning team will help communities bring together local residents and other stakeholders to decide on strategies and an action plan to grow the local outdoor recreation economy. The planning assistance process will take place over four to six months, with a focal point being a facilitated community workshop where participants will identify a vision, goals, and specific actions. This workshop could be held in person, as a series of virtual work sessions, or a combination of both, depending on travel limitations due to the COVID pandemic. Eligible applicants include local governments, Indian tribes, and nonprofit institutions and organizations representing any community in the US. Application Deadline is **November 22**.
